
It is difficult to express the level of gratitude I have for the scholarship my son Spencer, 16, received from the Wilderness Awareness School. This scholarship allowed him to participate in Wild Within, a once-per-month weekend program. Without it, there was no way he could have attended.

Wild Within has been Spencer's footing and foundation in many critical ways. It has also been his joy. For a boy like Spencer with a busy and overloaded solo mom (who also grapples daily with disabling chronic illness), virtually no additional family, and zero financial resources to devote to cost-based experiences or education, the opportunity to participate in Wild Within has been life-altering, in the most positive ways.

Because Spencer is a fairly talkative boy, I am fortunate to hear details about Spencer's camping weekends (often after a nap). His sharing inevitably fills my heart with gratitude for the wonderful time he had, the support he experienced, the meaningful relationships that grew for him, and the education he received.

Since he spends most of his time close to home, I can tell Spencer is thrilled when he gets to see other places with Wild Within. For instance, he could not get over the beauty and topography in Eastern Washington at Umtanum Canyon. At Deception Pass, he experienced completely new areas on foot that I wouldn't be able to take him to by summiting a peak where he had a view of one of our favorite family places. On another trip to San Juan Island, he was awestruck to observe dozens of black foxes.

Spencer has been personally challenged in positive ways by camping outdoors and hiking. After a trip to Lake Serene, he told me he went on a hike that was harder than any other he had done. "I had to dig deep to keep going, but I did it"! The feelings of accomplishment and recognizing he could do hard things were written all over him!

Blue Heron Canoe Journey Success

We are deeply inspired by your support of the Blue Heron Canoe Journey! Your generosity raised \$3,105 for this multi-week event that celebrates the cultural lifeways of the Coast Salish people of the Pacific Northwest. Thanks to you, the trip was an amazing success.

While Blue Heron journeyed the past two years, this was the first full Tribal Canoe Journey since 2019, with over 100 canoes participating! The Blue Heron Canoe Journey ran from July 17 to July 30, traveling from Mukilteo to Whidbey Island to the San Juans and eventually ending at Alki Point. The journey was then followed by six days of Protocol at the Muckleshoot Reservation, where each canoe family had the opportunity to share songs, dancing, and more.

Along with your donation, which provided funding for food, travel, and supplies, Wilderness Awareness School provided a van and trailer and two drivers/helpers to support the journey.

We are deeply thankful for your support of our efforts to reach for Right Relations with our Indigenous neighbors and help uplift this important cultural practice of the Coast Salish people.

The Teacher I Was Meant to Be

As a child in Cleveland, I was not tested on my intuition, my sense of place, or my knowledge of where birds' nests were. My attention was focused on the outdoors, where I longed for the kind of deep connection with nature that children can have: energized by the newness, mystery, and truth of the living world.

Wilderness Awareness School turned what I was hungry for as a child into reality. My time as a student of The Immersion in 2008 gave me permission to be the type of person I was meant to be. This way of being-fully present, open, and curious in nature-was a dream I had thought was impossible for adults. I learned that I was not childish but childlike and that this was a strength I could bring to the world.

After graduating from The Immersion, an idea kept coming up for me: I needed to share my passion for nature-based education with children in the underserved community where I lived.

To start a business on my own was daunting, overwhelming, and risky, but upon reflection, WAS taught me to do this type of work and have the confidence to do it in my own way. After I moved to South Seattle, a very diverse community, I founded South Sound Nature School (SSNS) a non-profit that offers nature-based educational programs for children and adults. Now we're in our seventh year of summer camps, after-school

programs, and seasonal classes that teach to the senses, focus on learning from the seasons, and foster nature connection. SSNS has been a valuable resource for families, and they keep coming back year after year so children can consistently learn in this way.

I will always be grateful for my experiences in The Immersion, which truly changed my life for the better. And, I don't think that I could have participated without the scholarship I received. I'm amazed that not only is my life fulfilled by the school I founded but that I can now return the favor back to my own community by offering financial access and scholarships for our own programs! I'm grateful for the chance to give back and change lives in my own work.

Yes! I want to be a lifeline for those needing nature connection!
